Cooman: Companions

With ten first recordings of works by nine composers from

six countries, Carson Cooman's Companions is a remarkably coherent recital, the resulting kaleidoscope reflecting back on the organist-composer's own eclecticism and accent on direct communication. Bernard I.D. Heyes's expressive Organ Symphony no.15 forcefully illustrates that, as do Thomas Åberg's characterful Three Short Fantasy Pieces, and Cooman's own Recitative, a miniature making much of the Gaida organ's substantial Flauto mirabilis stop. Carol Williams's Scriabin-quoting Prismatic, Tate Pumfrey's Eucharistinfluenced Sursum Corda and

⊲ Carlotta Ferrari's tolling *The Grave of Keats* provide contrast aplenty in a satisfying, well-recorded disc with good booklet notes by Cooman.
